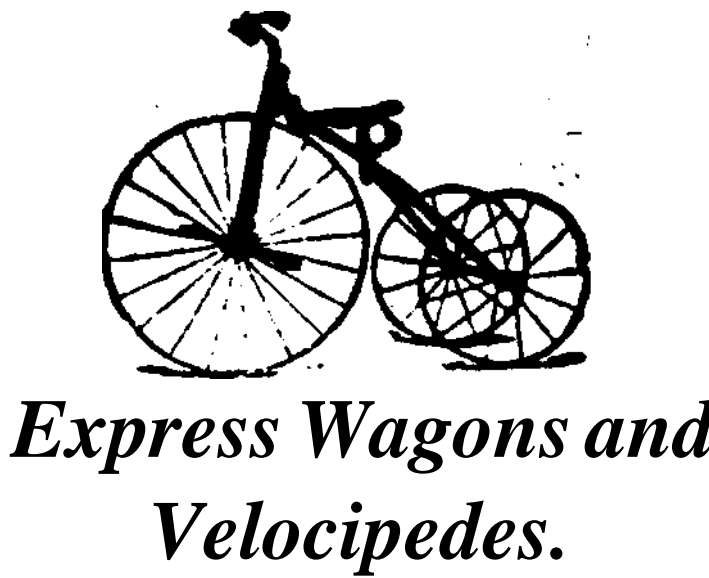

Those of Cayuga Join Those of Broome and Chemung.

The Cayuga County Fish and Game club has received a communication from the Bingbampton Rod and Gun club asking it to enter protest against the amendment to Section 36-A of the Fish and Game laws, which if it becomes a law will allow the sale of game birds in this State which the law now prohibits, excepting duck.

All true sportsmen should protest against this amendment. The Cayuga County Fish and Game club has entered its protest to Senator Wilcox and Assemblymen Allen and Hapeman at Albany, and other prominent sportsmen have written.

A communication from the Chemung County Fish and Game club assures the Cayuga County club that the Chemung representative, Sherman W. Moreland, who is on the Rules Committee and leader of the Assembly, has promised faithfully to call the net law repeal bill from the committee and bring it before the House for action. It will probably be done this week.
