

The door was looked, but an examination of the look proved it to be like about halt the looks in this alleged jaildefective, and a little tap on one side of it with the hand caused it to apring open. When the prisoners made this discovery is not known but they have evidently been to work at the hole some time, using as an instrument to tear away the mortar and stone an iron bar taken from a hedstead. This bole must bave been completed yesterday afternoon, for at 3:30 o'clock eleven of the iomates crawled through st. into the chicken coop. Passing into the yard, they discovered a ladder Which they placed against the jail yard wail at the southeast corner. and climbing up this they passed through a window into Hollister's lumber house.

Sheriff Schoeffel's son, George B. Schoeffel, with a friend, was paying a visit to the jail, and white lessurety-walking to the apper corridor o the wing, he glanced out of the south window. To his great surprice he saw the ladder against the wall in the yard, and scrambling up this ladder were the two of the eleven who had made their escape. That these were prisoners of the jail he bad no doubt, and with haste be notified his father, who was 'at the time in the office; Sheriff Schoeffel at cuce called the tele phone office for a connection with the police station to ask for assistsace.
