Board of Education. REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING. AUGUST 6, 1872. The Board convened at 7.45 P. M. Present - Messrs. Fowler, Moses, Bristol, Mosher, Schoonmaker, Pomroy, Selover, Bascom, Hayden, B. B. Snow, Secretary, and Miles Perry acting as chairman in the absence of Mr. Williams.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS. Mr. Schoonmaker moved the sale of a gore on No. 5 school house lot. Adopted by 8 yeas to 4 nays. Mr. Fowler said that the contractors on the new school buildings desired some of their pay, and said they could probably obtain it on the recommendation of Mr. Hamblin.

Mr. Bristol thought the yard a poor place to play ball, and it should be prevented by the teachers of the school. This would be proper and right, perfectly reasonable. Chair would oppose all prohibition on boys playing ball.

On motion of Mr. Schoonmaker the whole matter was referred to a special committee of three. Ayes and nays being called for, the vote was 7 to 3, Messrs. Moses, Bascom and Bristol voting nay. The chair appointed Messrs. Schoonmaker, Pomroy, and Mosher as said committee. Adjourned.

Col. T. J. Kennedy, whose gallant record with his flying battery in the late rebellion, fits him for the task, is to deliver the opening address at the September reunion of the "old 19th" and 3d Artillery, in which he will give the only attempt ever made at a history of the regiment from its origin, and including the disgraceful and ever detestable "shoddy" period, the merest recollection of which tingles the blood with ire.

It must not be supposed by your readers, that this city is bonded for the Murdock route. This is probably far from being the case. Several hundreds of thousands of dollars and some hundreds of names, it is understood, are yet to be procured, before that consummation is reached.

This is one of the most atrocious laws on the statute book, the constitutionality of which is doubted by some of the best legal talent in the State, and which will doubtless soon be tested. It is now more than a year since the attempt to bond this city by the Murdock line was commenced.

Obstacles to delay proving these consents, have been thrown in the way by prominent advocates of the Murdock line, one of whom publicly declared, a few days since, he would prevent its being completed within two years.
