A MYSTERY SOLVED.

Mrs. Elizabeth Clark Was the Mysterious Suicide of Owasco.

CAME FROM SKANEATELES.

She Left the Home of Her Daughter on Tuesday Morning and Said No Word of Farewell to Any One—Her Relatives Are at a Loss to Account for Her Rash Act.

The identity of the woman who was found in a dying condition, under a tree on the farm of Mrs. J. C. Schaefer, about six miles from the city in the town of Owasco, Tuesday afternoon, has been established. The dead woman is Mrs. Elizabeth Clark, of Skaneateles, 62 years of age.

The woman, it will be remembered, was first seen in the vicinity of Scantlebury hill, about 11 o'clock Tuesday. She stopped at a farm house and was given a drink of water. About 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Mrs. Schaefer saw a woman in the hay field opposite the house, and going to the fence, Mrs. Schaefer saw the woman suddenly fall.

It was by accident that the woman's identity was made known. Henry W. Bray lives in Skaneateles and came to the city Thursday. He is a gardener and was disposing of garden produce.

Justice Gillette, of Skaneateles, was communicated with but he could furnish no light on the mystery, and it was not until some time later that the woman's name was discovered.

Mr. and Mrs. Otis Gillette, also of Skaneateles, were about to start for Auburn that morning, when they heard that the woman who was at Tallman's was Mrs. Elizabeth Clark. They came on to the city and Mrs. Gillette identified the dead woman as Mrs. Clark.

The dead woman has a sister in Skaneateles, Mrs. Edwin Gillette, and a daughter, of the same place, Mrs. George Barber, with whom she lived.

There is also an unmarried sister who resides in Michigan, and is visiting Mrs. Edwin Gillette. Another sister, Mrs. Will Beach, resides in Marechal and Mrs. Toppie, a fourth sister, is living near Baldwinsville.

Mr. Barber came to the city Thursday morning. He was seen by a reporter but could give but little further information concerning the dead woman. He said she left his house Tuesday morning. She put on her hat and shawl and went away from the house without saying a word to anyone.

When night came on and she did not return there was no feeling of uneasiness in the Barber family, as Mrs. Clark was in the habit of visiting in the village, and staying over night. Mrs. Barber did not think her mother had gone far as she took no extra clothing with her.

Mr. Barber did not hear of Mrs. Clark's death until Thursday and it was not until he reached the city that he learned that laudanum caused her death. He said he would not imagine what had caused her to do such a thing unless her mind had become unbalanced. He said she was visiting his sister, Mrs. Hill, Sunday and while there complained of her head. She had also complained at the house of her head giving her pain and Mr. Barber thinks that her mind must have been weakened.

The remains were taken to Skaneateles that afternoon and the funeral was held from Mr. Barber's house.

DR. C. A. GROOT.

Sketch of the Life of the Well Known Physician Who Died Friday.

The sudden death of Cornelius Abraham Groot, M. D., which occurred at his home Friday afternoon, has caused widespread regret. Dr. Groot was a native of this city, having been born here on April 3, 1837.

Cornelius A. was educated in the common school and old academy. From the latter institution he went to Union college at Albany where he was graduated with the class of 1864 at the age of 27 years. He then began the study of medicine with Dr. Warren Wilkie of this city, finally going to the Albany Medical school.

Dr. Groot was a member of the Cayuga County Medical society and a member of the St. Paul's lodge, F. and A. M. He was married on August 24, 1865 to Miss Stevens, of Albany.

He was a member of the Northern part of the county and in this city. He was a whole hearted, man, faithful and loyal and he will be sincerely mourned.

Priddy, of Spring Lake, for \$113,713.

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ACONTRACTOR'S TROUBLES.

Mill Owners Threaten Mr. Hallock and His Workmen Strike.

Contractor Hallock, who is doing the State work on the outlet, is having troubles of his own. For a week past he has had men at work building a dam to shut the water off so that he could dredge the outlet. The work was finished Monday and that night the water was cut off.

Contractor Hallock's troubles began about 10 o'clock or earlier. He was called upon, and later investigated in a heated way by delegations from various industries. There was some large sized kicking done. Men were up from D. M. Osborne & Co., Dunn & McArthur's, Nye & Wait's and several of the smaller mills. The contractor was warmly treated. He was told that these places were handicapped in a very great measure and that he would have to suffer for any loss that they might sustain.

This was not all. Contractor Hallock has had about 25 men at work under him for a week. They were receiving \$1.25 per day and were satisfied until Tuesday morning. At this time, however, the character of their work was changed. Instead of building a dam they were put to clearing the mud and stones out of the bed of the outlet. According to the statement of some of the men, they "had to work in mud up to their necks."

Contractor Hallock will hereafter do the work at night.

IS IT MURDER?

A Former Resident of Auburn Mysteriously Shot in Pennsylvania. AURORA, Aug. 10.—A DuBois, Pa. dispatch says that Dwight Wilson, formerly of Aurora, died from the effects of a gunshot wound late on Saturday night, and there is a suspicion that he was murdered.
