WRIGHT ANNOUNCES THE SUPERVISORS' COMMITTEES

Auburn Fares Well With Four Members on Equalization Board—Ira and Fleming Make a Kick on Road Designations.

The members of the Board of Supervisors convened for the first quarterly session of 1920 this morning and Chairman Daniel S. Wright of Weedsport named his list of standing committees for the year. Chairman James S. Pethybridge of Union Springs was named head of the regular Highway Committee and the Special Committee on Highways.

Resolution Laid Over. A resolution advocating the Townsend Highway Bill in Congress relative to the distribution of Federal aid moneys and the construction of the national system of highways, was laid over until tomorrow on account of debate. County Superintendent of Highways Dayton was opposed to the Townsend Bill and favored the present Bankhead Bill.

The salary of the stenographer to the county treasurer was boosted to \$900 per year. The figure presented by the Salary Committee in December was \$800 while the intention of the committee was to make same \$900.

Board Considers

On motion of Supervisor Fitzgerald, the board concurred in the designations.

On motion of Supervisor Fitzgerald the resolution passed at the last meeting designating the Cato Citizen as the Democrat paper to publish court notices for 1920 was withdrawn and expunged from the records.

On resolution of Supervisor Quill the board endorsed the proposed bills in the State Legislature introduced by Senator Gibbs and Assemblyman Spicer giving the Public Service Commission power to suspend enforcement of increase in rates by telephone, telegraph and electric companies pending determination of the justice of such increase.

The law gives the P. S. Commission power in the case of railroad companies and the proposed bills seek to include the other companies named. The clerk was directed to notify Corporation Counsel William S. Elder of Auburn of the action taken, as that official leaves for Albany tomorrow to appear for the city in opposition to the boost in telephone rates which went into effect December 1 last for use of New York Telephone Company phones. Record Demand for Jobs

The largest registration of applicants for positions ever recorded in the office of the State Employment Bureau took place last week, indicating that many people are desirous of changing their positions, as a large number of the registrants are now working. The registration of males was 60, including three aliens and four foreign-born, and also two females.

The demand for the week included 26 males and eight females; 36 males and five females were referred to positions. During the week 20 males and three females were reported hired. The call was for common laborers rather than factory help.
