HONOR TO GEN. GRANT. He Speaks to the People. A BRILLIANT TORCHLIGHT TURNOUT IN THE EVENING. Following the maddly parade of yesterday afternoon, an immense throng assembled at the two o'clock wigwam of the D. M. Osborne rescue company to hear speakers and await the coming of the lion of the day, Gen. Grant.

The special train arrived at 3:55, stopping at the wigwam instead of proceeding to the depot, having made the trip from Syracuse in forty minutes, which is thirty-five minutes less than the usual time for the twenty-seven miles.

Accompanying Gen. Grant, as escort, were Gordon W. Allen, Esq., and Charles L. Sheldon, Esq., Mayor Hendrick of Syracuse, conductor Fred Moschelle, Maj. Pooler, U. S. Pension Agent, and James Geddes, Esq., of Syracuse.

The torch was lighted by colored fires and the blaze of Roman candles, the glare of rockets and the illumination of many residences, offices and business places along the route.

DEATH OF BENJAMIN LATTIN. Mr. Benjamin Lattin, a resident of this county for half a century, and for the past fifteen years a respected citizen of Auburn, died on Tuesday morning at his home on Franklin street.
