Arundel announced quotations as follows: Apples, \$1 a bushel, beets, five cents a bunch, beans (dry), 10 cents a pound, broilers (live), 30 cents a pound, carrots, five cents a bunch, celery, 10 cents a bunch, cauliflower, 10 cents a head, cab-

bage, 10 cents a head; eggs, 60 cents a dozen; Hubbard squash, three cents a pound; peppers, \$1.25 a bushel; ducks (live), 25 cents a pound, onions, \$1.50 a bushel. There will be no dispute about it if Ohio State finishes with a clean slate and wins the "big ten" title. The Buckeyes, after battling Princeton this week, play Iowa and Illinois, at present the only two remaining conference teams neither beaten nor tied.

JOHN E. RICH, 82. CIVIL WAR VET IS CALLED BY DEATH

Constable and Former Deputy Sheriff Dies At Steel Street Home.

John E. Rich, 82, Civil War Veteran and one of the best known public officials of Cayuga County for several decades, died at his apartment, 9 Steel Street, last evening after a brief illness. Mr. Rich underwent an operation for removal of cataract from his eye several weeks ago and was apparently in good health up to a week ago when he declined rapidly and passed peacefully away last evening.

John E. Rich was born in the Town of Cato and had resided in Cayuga County practically all his life. For many years he was a deputy sheriff of the county and also a constable, serving in the latter capacity up to the time of his death. He was known as a thorough and painstaking official and highly esteemed by all with whom he came in contact.

Mr. Rich was one of the oldest members of Cato Lodge of Masons in the Civil War he fought with the Third New York Light Artillery and served with valor in many of the major engagements of the war. He was a member of Seward-Crocker Post of the G. A. R.

Surviving are a son, James F. Rich of Auburn, several nephews of which Supreme Court Justice Adelbert P. Rich is one, and several nieces.

Private funeral services will be held Saturday from the home of his son, James F. Rich, 10 Tuxill Square. Friends are invited to call Friday afternoon. Rev. Ralph C. Walker, pastor of the Central Church of Christ, Disciples, will officiate. Burial will be in Fort Hill Cemetery. Omission of flowers is requested.

In honor of John E. Rich, Civil War veteran, who died last night at his home in Steel Street, the flag in Richardson Square will be placed at half mast.
