

GIRL SAVES 2 FROM COAL GAS DEATHS

MAKES PLUCKY FIGHT TO OPEN WINDOW AS FUMES POUR IN.

Heroism of a 13-year-old girl, who fought off the effects of coal gas long enough to grope through a gas-filled house to the side of her prostrate mother early yesterday, saved the mother's life and her own, at Rochester.

The little girl, Cora Ellen Darrow, and her mother, Mrs. Howard O. Darrow, formerly of Auburn, were resting easily at their home, No. 4 Tioga Street, Roselawn, last night, only little the worse for the dangerous experience. Howard Darrow, Cora's father, in charge of the night office at Strong Memorial Hospital, was absent at the time of the tragedy.

According to Mr. Darrow, Mrs. Darrow awoke before daylight yesterday unaware she had been affected by coal gas which had seeped into the house from the furnace in the night. She collapsed when she stepped from bed, he said.

Cora, hearing her mother fall, arose to investigate. Before she could reach her mother's side, she too collapsed.

Fighting off the apathy, Cora staggered to her mother, and revived her by dashing water in her face. Then she crept to a window and opened it. Both lay on the floor for several minutes before Cora revived sufficiently to open other windows.

When Mr. Darrow returned home three hours later, his wife was in bed under the care of Cora. Fresh air had driven out the gas. Cora is a pupil at Brighton school where she plays on a basketball team. She has also won laurels as a swimmer and athlete.

Mr. Darrow will be remembered as Democratic candidate for sheriff and for member of assembly in Cayuga County a number of years ago.

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WARDEN'S TIP MAY MEAN LIFE TERM FOR ACTOR

Discovery by Warden Edgar S. Jennings of another felony conviction in the record of John R. Curry, 55-year-old Bostonian, an actor in the old melodrama days, may mean life imprisonment for the inmate who was received at Auburn Prison February 15 to begin a sentence of 10 years on a forgery charge.

Curry will be taken back to Syracuse by Onondaga County authorities for resentencing. The additional felony will mean that he must be given a life imprisonment term unless he is permitted to plead guilty to a lesser charge.

Curry's record includes a term of five years in Concord, Mass., reformatory when he was 15 years old, for removing tools from a house in process of construction. The two other felonies are a burglary charge, which resulted in a five to seven year term in Massachusetts prison in 1936 and serving one year and nine months for a burglary four years ago.

SEMINARY HOLDS LIBRARY PARTY

Observes Advent of Electric Lights in Dodge-Morgan Building.

The Dodge-Morgan Library building of Auburn Seminary was the scene of unusual social activity, last evening. The faculty and students of the seminary and School of Religious Education gathered to celebrate the tremendous strides taken by that most essential part of the equipment of the seminary.

The most obvious improvement is the installation of electric lights. For many years the only lighting in the library building was by the means of gas, a most unsatisfactory condition. The new lights will make it possible to use the library for study during the evening as well as the day.

After the arrival of the guests, President Harry Reed introduced Dr. William J. Hinke, who is at present acting librarian. Doctor Hinke expressed his immense satisfaction with the improvement in the lighting of the library which had displaced the medieval darkness. Lights in all alcoves had been turned on for the occasion and for once there was light on the theology.

He spoke of the second great improvement, the near completion of the recataloging of all books of the library. This work has been going on since 1923. The former system was most inadequate. The present system is based on that of Union Theological Seminary and the Library of Congress. It is scientific and up-to-date, capable of caring for all necessary expansion. This work is practically complete, a tremendous task and expensive operation.

Doctor Hinke also spoke of the use of the library, the fine equipment in the line of dictionaries, reference books, encyclopedias giving the student ready information on almost any subject. For the use of students preparing for the ministry its speciality is books of theology. Its 43,000 volumes give a splendid working library. He closed with a plea for the careful use of library books and the prompt return of the same.

The guests were invited to partake of light refreshments served under the direction of Mrs. William J. Hinke and her trio of capable library assistants. The tables had been very prettily decorated with flowers and candies, giving a most pleasing effect to the historic old alcoves. Many expressions of appreciation were forthcoming as the guests departed with a sense of having seen a most attractive future for the Dodge-Morgan Library of Auburn Seminary.

PAROLED CONVICT IS ARRESTED FOR PENN YAN POLICE

Arrested by the local police for Penn Yan authorities yesterday, a few hours before his wife gave birth to an infant, their second child, Arthur Schofield, 32, of 19 1/2 Perrine Street, was taken back to Penn Yan this morning by Corp. E. H. Fox of the state police, to face charges of grand larceny in the second degree and burglary in the second degree.

According to the police, Schofield, who is a paroled convict of Auburn Prison, served a two-year sentence for grand larceny. He was convicted of stealing a motor car in Syracuse. He has been on parole for about 11 months.

Schofield admits the theft of jewelry from a house, and a Ford coupe in Penn Yan on the night of February 12, the police say. According to Schofield's alleged story to the police, he drove the car to Pennsylvania, and on a return trip to Auburn had an accident on a hill near Ithaca. He brought the crippled car to a garage in South Lansing, where the repair bill came to \$30. Not having the cash to pay for the job, he sold the car for \$25 to the owner of the garage, he said, using the automobile registration papers of Charles Margeson of 319 North Avenue, Penn Yan, owner of the car, to effect the sale. He stated he found the registration papers in the car.

Penn Yan police authorities, working on the theft there, became suspicious of Schofield, the police here say, because of the visit he paid that city occurred at about the same time the theft was reported. He was arrested on one warrant, charging grand larceny, second degree, by Sgt. Daniel M. Randall of the local police yesterday. He readily admitted the thefts and returned some of the stolen jewelry, the police say. His story in regard to the sale of the car is being investigated.

REV. PAUL EAKIN SPEAKS AT UNION

Rev. Paul Eakin, missionary to Siam, who is home for a year, spoke yesterday in the Woman's Union parlors at the Wednesday afternoon talk and tea on his experiences and observations in Siam. The climate in that country, he said, is very warm and snow and ice are unknown; in fact the mercury in thermometers seldom goes below 50 degrees.

Peculiar customs, strange beliefs and many interesting characteristics of the country and its people Mr. Eakin described in his talk. The Siamese language, he said, depends for meaning on expression used in pronouncing words. One word may have many different meanings and one has to be extremely careful in saying words in order not to convey the opposite meaning one desires to express, Mr. Eakin said. Mr. Eakin is stationed at Bangkok and is a Presbyterian missionary.

Trolley Line Sets Deficit At \$5,708

Geneva, March 8.—(AP)—The Geneva, Seneca Falls & Auburn trolley line which is being operated by James M. Ryan and Lansing S. Hoskins, Geneva attorneys as receivers, suffered an operating loss of \$5,708 in the last three months of 1937, according to the report of the company.

The company operates interurban cars between Geneva and Seneca Falls and a bus line in Geneva. The tracks of the old line over which cars formerly were operated in Geneva still remain in the streets.

The company has reported losses for years and finally last year receivers were named. The report shows a decrease of more than \$500 in revenues compared with the same period of the previous year, which balanced a saving of \$500 in operating expenses. The net corporate loss for the period is given as \$10,328.
