SENECA COUNTY.

Death of Michael Woods, a Well Known Resident of the Falls.—Other Notes.

SENECA FALLS, April 5.—Michael Woods, a well known citizen of this place, died this morning at his home in Garden street, aged about 60 years. Mr. Woods was around in his usual health on Saturday last when he contracted a severe cold which developed to pneumonia. This resulted in his death, which comes as a great shock to his family and many friends. The deceased was born in Ireland, immigrated to this country when very young, and had spent many years of his life here. He was a moulder by occupation, but for several seasons was employed the position of locktender on the Seneca canal. He was an honest and industrious citizen and respected by all who knew him. He is survived by his wife, two sons, Sylvester and James, and three daughters, Mrs. Michael Mazilli, Mrs. Andrew Clark and Miss Celia Woods, all of this place. The funeral arrangements have not been made at this writing.

The death of Nathaniel Howell, a highly respected resident of this place, occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Joseph DeCory, in Clinton street, yesterday afternoon. His age was 72 years. He is survived by two sons and two daughters. The funeral will be held at the home of Mr. DeCory on Sunday at 2:30 p. m.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Nancy Holbrook will be held at the family home in Mynders street to-morrow afternoon at 2:30. Rev. H. G. Person, pastor of the Presbyterian church, will officiate.

The condition of Floyd A. Babcock, who was seriously injured Monday by being thrown from his bicycle, is not much changed. The bones have not yet begun to knit and some difficulty is experienced in keeping them in place, owing to the nature of the fracture, as the act of swallowing operates the muscles that control the jaw. Notwithstanding this his physicians express themselves as well pleased with his physical condition up to this time. He is unable to take any solid food and the only nourishment he can take is liquid. To administer this it was found necessary to extract some of his teeth.

FOUR RECRUITS.

THE INJUNCTION DISSOLVED.

The Council is Now Free to Revoke the Citizens' Light Company's Franchise.

Justice William S. Andrews, of Syracuse, to-day handed down a decision in the proceedings brought by the Auburn Common Council to vacate the temporary injunction granted by Special County Judge A. H. Searling which restrained the Common Council from revoking the franchise granted to the Citizens' Light and Power company of Auburn.

By the terms of the franchise the company should have commenced operations Jan 1. The aldermen, after a hearing, decided that the terms of the grant had not been complied with and decided to revoke the franchise. Just as they were about to do so, eight aldermen having pledged themselves in writing to that effect, a restraining injunction which had been granted by Judge Searling, was served.

The aldermen later retained John Van Sickle, of the firm of Payne, Van Sickle & Payne, and he went before Justice Andrews at Syracuse with a motion to dissolve the injunction. The company asked for an order continuing the injunction. By the decision handed down to-day this is denied and the injunction is dissolved, thus leaving the Council free to revoke the grant.

What further action will be taken is not known.

A SOLDIER'S FUNERAL.

The remains of the late William Henry Morse, a private in Company L, Ninth United States Infantry, who died on board the United States transport Sheridan on October 9, while on his way home, arrived in this city this morning. Private Morse's body, it will be remembered, was buried in the National cemetery at the Presidio, San Francisco, and it was not until late in the Winter that the gallant soldier's relatives knew of his death.

Services were held at the grave in Fort Hill this afternoon, Rev. John Brainard, D. D., rector of St. Peter's church, officiating. The remains were escorted to the grave by a squad from the Second Separate company.

DEATH OF H. G. WYCKOFF.

Henry G. Wyckoff, of Niles, died very suddenly yesterday afternoon of apoplexy. He has been in poor health for several months, but it was not expected that he would be so suddenly summoned. For several years Mr. Wyckoff was a guard on the prison in this city. He was born in the town of Fleming where he resided for many years. Two of his brothers died very recently and besides his wife and daughter, Mrs. Thomas Church, of this city, he is survived by one sister. He was a member of Union Springs lodge, F. & A. M., and of the A. O. U. W. The funeral will be held at his late residence in Niles Monday at 11 a. m. Burial will be in Fort Hill cemetery, this city. The services at the grave will be in charge of St. Paul's lodge, F. and A. M., of this city.
